Improvements at Trinity Community Church *Report by Jim Paterson*

In past issues we have reported on repairs and refurbishment to your church, including removal of pews for comfortable individual cushioned seating, repairs to the sanctuary heating system, to replace all the leaking and rusting pipework.

As you might expect the more you do, the more you uncover that needs to be done. After standing for over 250 years almost anything you open will look in need of at least TLC inside.

Trying to keep the building wind and watertight is a never ending battle against the elements. Our building convenor Gordon MacDonald will tell you the thousands of manhours over the years he has expended in getting the roof, the gutters and downpipes, the windows and doors, heating system, water and drainage, painting, decorating, carpeting and furniture fixed, albeit with help from others.

Just before Christmas our friendly contractor John Findlay and his crew rebuilt the rear window frames, both upstairs and down, which had suffered severe wet rot, letting more rain in than they kept out. Being a listed building we are unable to fit UPVC frames so wooden sash windows have to be repaired. The sills were all replaced, and the frames repaired, with immense skill required to remove the expensive glass panes to work on the wooden frames. The front stained glass windows are metal framed and they too were in a sorry state. Removing these windows is not an option taken lightly, and fortunately John Findlay managed to effectively rebuild them in situ making them wind and waterproof. Job done? Not quite.

Gutters and downpipes get blocked with leaves and grit. Some downpipes had to be completely replaced. We are all familiar with what happens when water freezes in a milk bottle, the same in a downpipe, as the water in the blocked pipe freezes then melts it expands at around +4 degrees. With nowhere to go it cracks the cast iron downpipe, requiring a replacement section or in severe cases a complete top to ground replacement. Renewing the plumbing where all that water goes when it reaches the ground has also been upgraded. Choked drains have been rebuilt, note the new manhole cover as you reach the church entrance, making it easier to access any future blockages for rodding to dislodge blockages and clear.



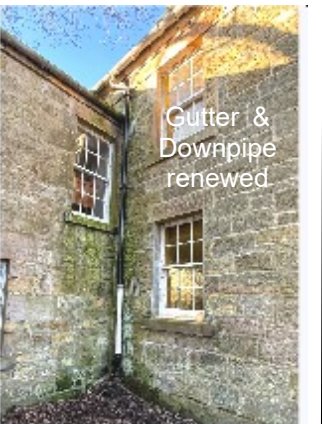
Kentigern bell tower

All done now? Not yet. The building requires a complete rewiring. Upgrading the lighting and power outlet sockets will be included. This is due to start soon, and during the works our Sunday services will be held in the church hall, similar to what we did during the pew removals.

Meantime the old Kentigern Bell tower was approaching completion with new roof now fitted and walls pointed

A bit like the Forth Bridge I hear you say. Yes, but if we keep it under control it should be easier to manage and less costly to repair.

Our building convenor Gordon MacDonald has decided to gradually pass on the baton, after 45 years of unflinching service, against at times seemingly impossible odds. A committee from the Kirk Session is looking at how to divide up the huge breadth of responsibilities that Gordon has carried out. If you have skills in maintaining church or large commercial buildings and are willing to join a team then please speak to Neil Cape (Session Clerk), who will welcome you with open arms.

Departed but not forgotten

Graham Bell - 9 January

Many members will remember Graham who joined most Sunday morning services, using the TV transcription service to follow the speakers talks, due to his severe hearing loss.



Graham grew up in Surrey, one of three brothers. He loved music, which he played on the piano, by ear, with the service including some of the hymns he used to play. The theme from his favourite film 'The Sound of Music' welcomed the congregation to this service. In his youth he helped to form the South London Witness Team, taking many services singing and telling other young people about Jesus.

Graham was also well known for his Artwork producing wonderful gifts for both family and friends He also passed his driving test as a Bus Driver and was much used by Oakhall Christian Holidays, travelling as far as Poland and Czechoslovakia.

On the occasion of Graham's parents' 50th wedding anniversary he drove a double decker bus around the villages to pickup some 60 guests from bus stop pickup points!

When he moved to Scotland he settled in Penicuik, and joined our Sunday morning praises.

Brother Mick, niece Kate, and nephew Dave all presented memories of Graham.

Rosemary Marwick - 21 January

Rosemary was born in Cowdenbeath in June 1935, educated at Kirkcaldy High School. Holidays were at Newcastleton where she discovered the rural life was for her.



After leaving school she took a diploma in Agriculture and Dairying and soon found out that rising at 3am for 4am milking was the norm for farmers! She worked on a farm in the Cotswolds, including moving the complete farm to Somerset on the train!

Her link to making cheese was born in 1955 at the Dairy school in Ayr. Taking a role at the Animal Breeding Research Organisation in Roslin brought her into contact with a fellow student Michael Marwick, whom she married in June 1961.

Working on a mixed farm she began turning surplus milk into cheese. So successful were initial sales that it soon grew and Howgate Cheese was born. In 1967 the Langskail Milk Bar opened and soon grew into a full blown Farm Shop. As one of only 6 independent cheesemakers in Scotland, Rosemary expanded to produce Camembert and the renowned Howgate Brie.

As pubs moved into food and meals, Langskail changed from milk bar to a carvery. The venture was not successful, and the introduction of more regulations from Brussels made small cheese manufacturing difficult. An offer they couldn't refuse from a Dundee ice-cream maker was taken in 1992, with Rosemary retiring in 1995.

Howgate Brie can still be bought today, although it is now made in Campbelltown.

Each of the PCT churches provided two videos featuring one of their congregation nominating a hymn / song, and why they had chosen that particular title.

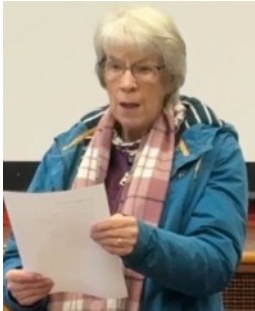

Guild - A Voyage Through the Scriptures By Boat - 5th January

The first Guild meeting of the new year welcomed David Hogg, presenting 'A Voyage Through the Scriptures By Boat' in both poetry and song.



Beginning with some audience participation and a vocal warm up we joined in with My Bonnie Lies Over The Ocean. David then started the journey across the sea at the beginning of Genesis with the Creation of the the Sky, the Earth and the Sea. More songs followed with The Skye Boat Song and then The Mermaid – a tale set in the North Atlantic about a seaman's encounter with a mermaid.



We moved on to the story of Noah who God was pleased with and built the Ark to survive the Great Flood. A poem by W. D. Cocker followed entitled The Deluge and written in Scots, an amusing description of Noah's story. We were then ready to sing What Will We Do With a Drunken Sailor. Next was the story of Jonah being sent to Nineveh by God and also being swallowed by a whale.

Following this we needed some Calm after the Storm with Jesus in the fishing boat on the Sea of Galilee. Continuing with the nautical theme we sang The Leaving of Liverpool before joining Paul on his travels to Rome including being shipwrecked.

Finally we arrived in Iona with St. Columba where a divinity centre was founded. To finish the voyage we sang the Iona Boat Song and the Mingulay Boat Song. David hoped we hadn't got too seasick!

Guild - Ruth Kirkpatrick; The Storyteller 19th January Jenny Ramage

The speaker today was Ruth Kirkpatrick a Storyteller. She began with telling us about when she was working as a social worker 28 years ago, going into Craigmillar School to work, together with the teachers, with the pupils many of which came from challenging backgrounds resulting in disruptive and unsettled behaviour in the classroom.

One of the teachers had an interest in traditional oral story telling which is when Ruth learnt about it. The roots of this tradition are kept alive by the travelling community. Ruth began using the stories in the classroom and found the children really responded well and would sit down and listen fascinated by the tales. She went on to study performance story telling and travelled the world doing this.



There is a Scottish Story Telling Centre in Edinburgh and Ruth's mentor was Stanley Robertson a renowned Romani Storyteller from Aberdeen. Ruth's work is varied from shows at the Edinburgh Fringe, local festivals and working in schools. We then heard some history of the Kirkpatrick family who came to Scotland from France in William the Conqueror's time, settling near Dumfries in the 1300's and building Closeburn Castle the oldest continuously inhabited tower house in Scotland, with links to Robert the Bruce and William Wallace and which Robert Burns visited.



It was then time for us to hear Ruth perform one of these traditional stories, a tale about a herring fishing family whose father was away at sea for a year so they ran out of food but when the children went to the neighbour she shut the door on them. A wee troll then visited the family and the mother made him a thin porridge, all she had. This kind act led them to be blessed and find gold coins in the peat so they could buy everything they needed. The neighbour heard about this and stole the peat but all that she found were mice which ate all her food so she went to the family to ask for food but the boy refused and shut the door. However the mother heard and went after the old lady and said I am your neighbour and whatever she needed she could have, a real example of a good neighbour.
